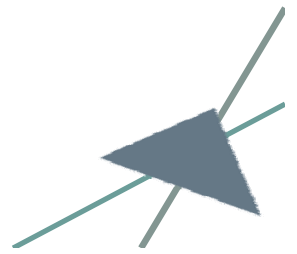

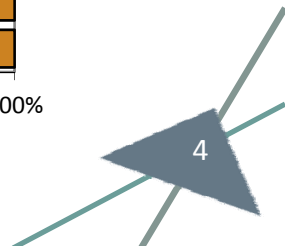
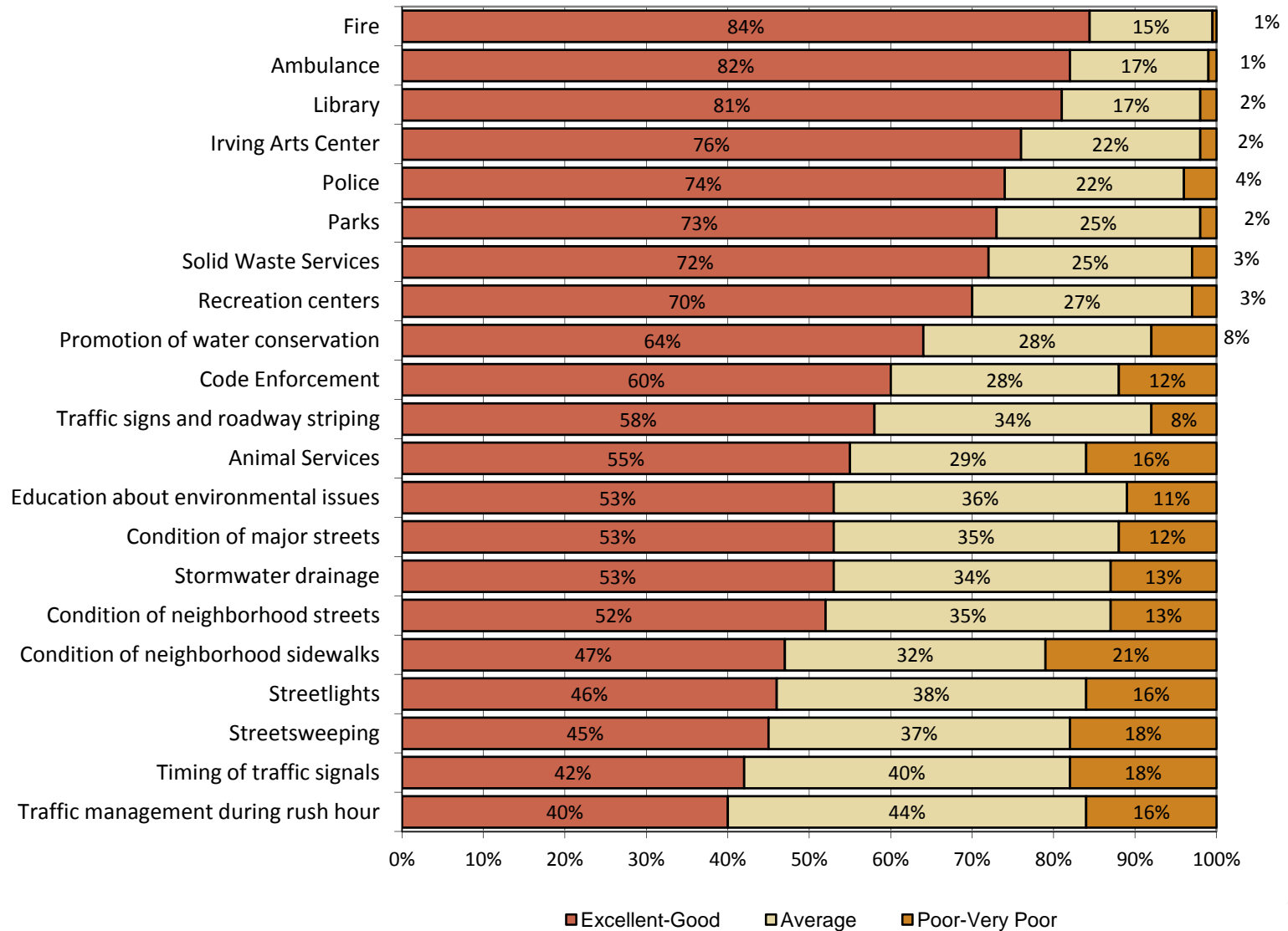

Survey Introduction

- 9,005 surveys were mailed to randomly-selected single family homes and apartments.
- 1,430 (16%) were returned by the due date
- Based on the sample size of 1,430, the sampling error (at the conventional 95% confidence level) is plus or minus 2.38 percent.

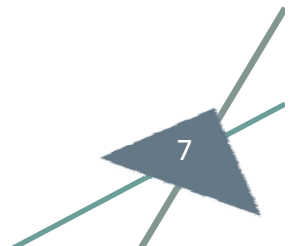

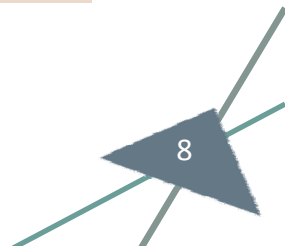
Positive Progress Toward Mission

- **81%** of residents are likely to remain in Irving for the next 5 years
- **76%** of residents would recommend living in Irving to someone else
- **71%** of those surveyed rated the overall quality of city services as “excellent” or “good”
- **76 of 79** quality and customer service questions included in the survey have either improved or maintained their ratings since 2006

Effective Communications



The city has taken great strides toward providing residents with improved quality of life elements such as the addition of new neighborhood parks.

The first phase of Northgate Park, one of the city's three newly acquired park properties, has been completed. Northgate is a 3.4-acre neighborhood park, located at the southeast corner of Richelle Road and Northgate Drive.

The city partnered with The Las Colinas Association to complete the first phase of development for Northgate Park.

The initial phase of development included an 8-foot concrete walking trail, barrier safety fencing along the railroad track, the addition of more than 100 seasonal and specimen trees, and soil improvements and irrigation. Northgate's playground, trail and other standard amenities are already open to the public. According to Irving Parks and Building Maintenance Director Chris Michalski, future development for Northgate will include the addition of a picnic pavilion and extended parking. The city and The Las Colinas Association will work in partnership on park maintenance.

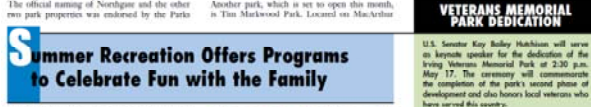
The official naming of Northgate and the other two park properties was endorsed by the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board and affirmed at a March City Council meeting.

Named to reflect its natural environment, what will now be known as Oak Meadows Park is located adjacent to the newly developed Gruff Farm housing development on Conder Drive. Lanston Park, named after a pioneering Irving family, is located on Irving Heights Drive, south of Grayley Road. Although Oak Meadows and Lanston parks are now being maintained by the city, development is scheduled for a future date.

Another park, which is set to open this month, is Tin Markwood Park. Located on Mackintosh Boulevard, this neighborhood park features a playground, picnic area and a walking trail.

Home to more than 43 parks, Irving has more than 2,000 acres of land currently maintained by the Parks and Recreation Department. Future park plans call for the addition of 14 new properties.

When those occasions arise, Parks and Recreation staff works to help residents who need rental facilities or outdoor pavilions for family enjoyment.

"Seeing families enjoying our facilities, programs and special celebrations is what really makes our jobs worthwhile," said Dwight Potts, recreation manager.

Parks and Recreation staff is looking forward to creating a new collection of recreational memories for Irving families.

VETERANS MEMORIAL PARK DEDICATION

U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison will serve as keynote speaker for the dedication of the Irving Veterans Memorial Park at 2:30 p.m. May 17. The ceremony will commemorate the completion of the park's second phase of development and also honor local veterans who have served this country.

Visitors will enjoy seeing large bronze statues of veteran soldiers when entering the main plaza. The park features commemorative walls depicting the various military branches and footprints of wars fought by past veterans. Other features include a Fountain of Hope, River of Freedom, World Map of Contributions and Commemorative Wall of Contributions.

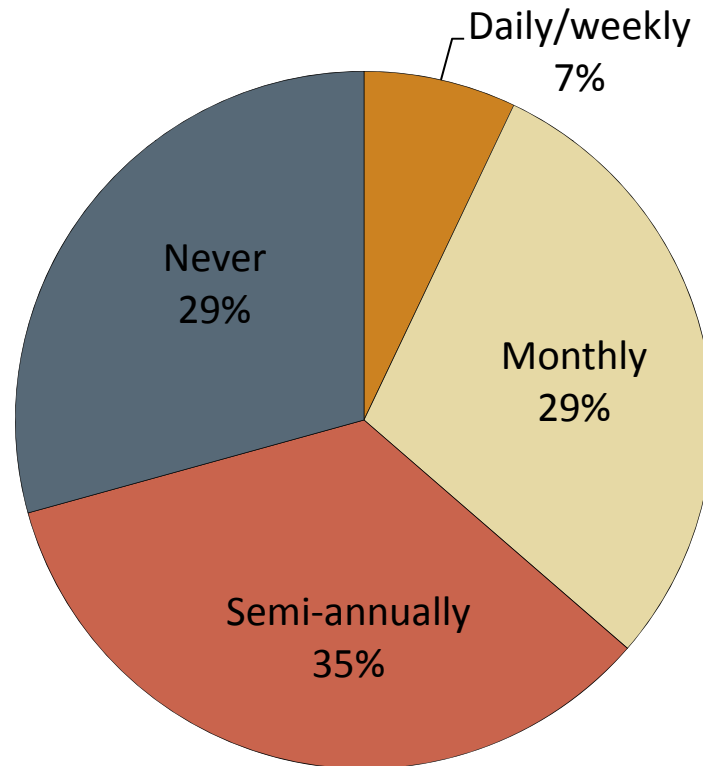

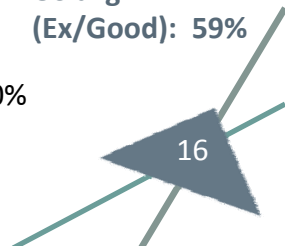
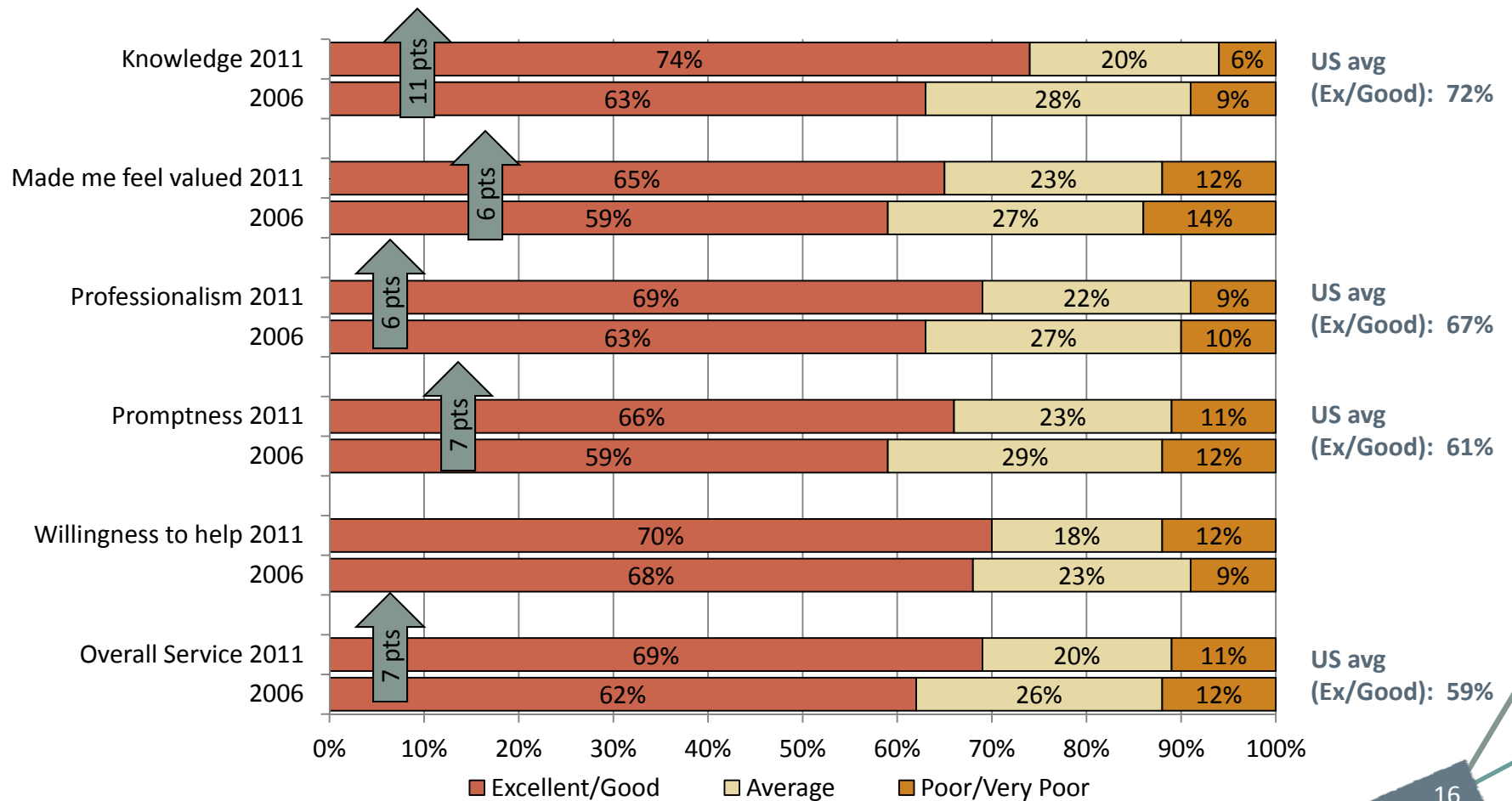
Service Quality Comparison

Percent rating customer service as excellent or good:

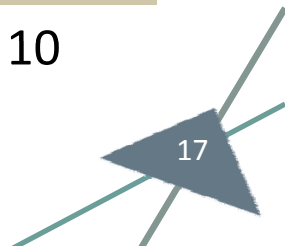

Recreation Center Usage



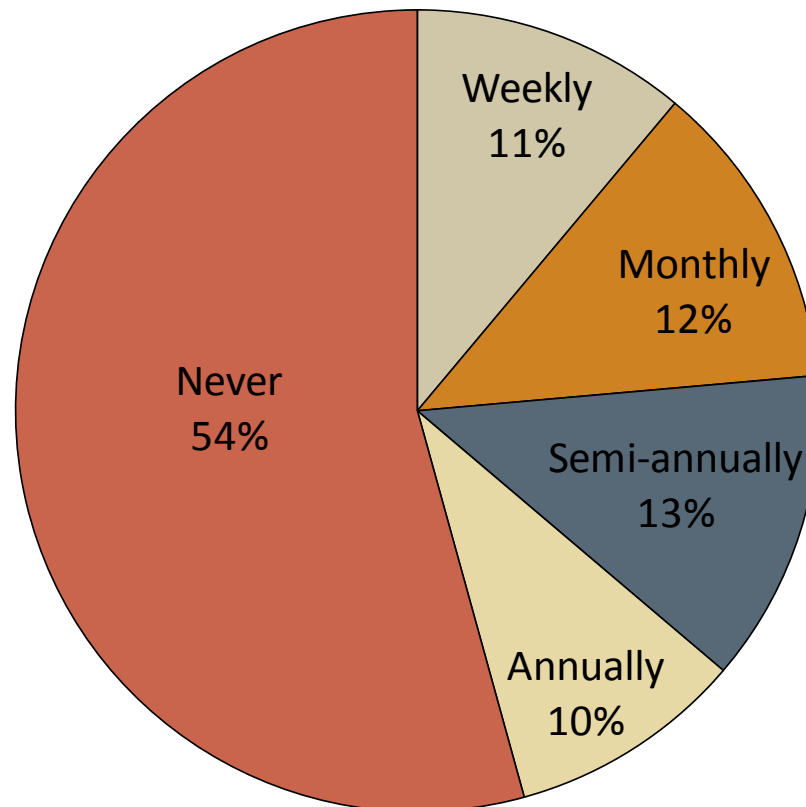

Park Usage



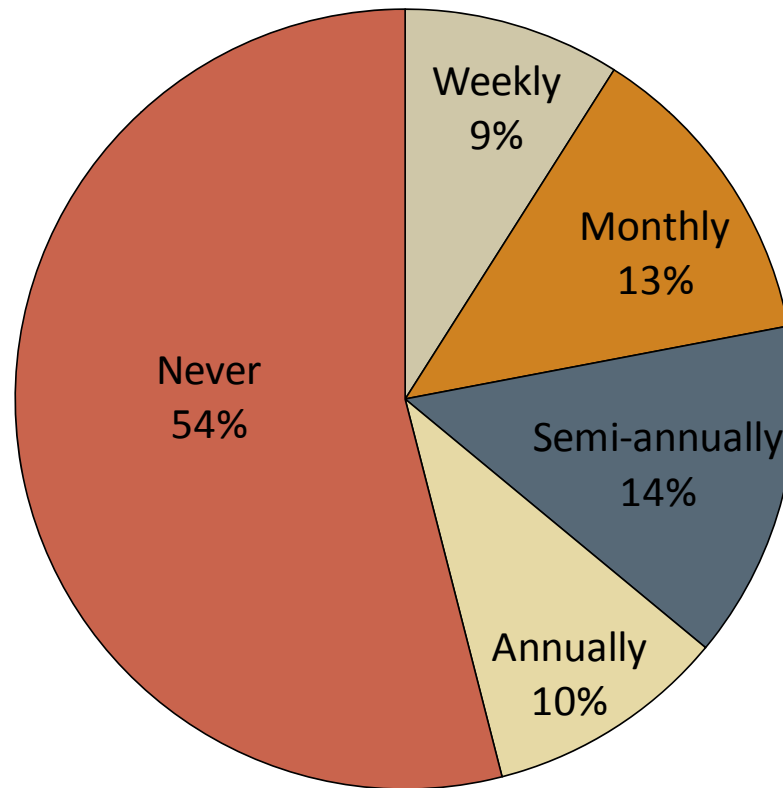

Pool/Aquatic Facility Usage

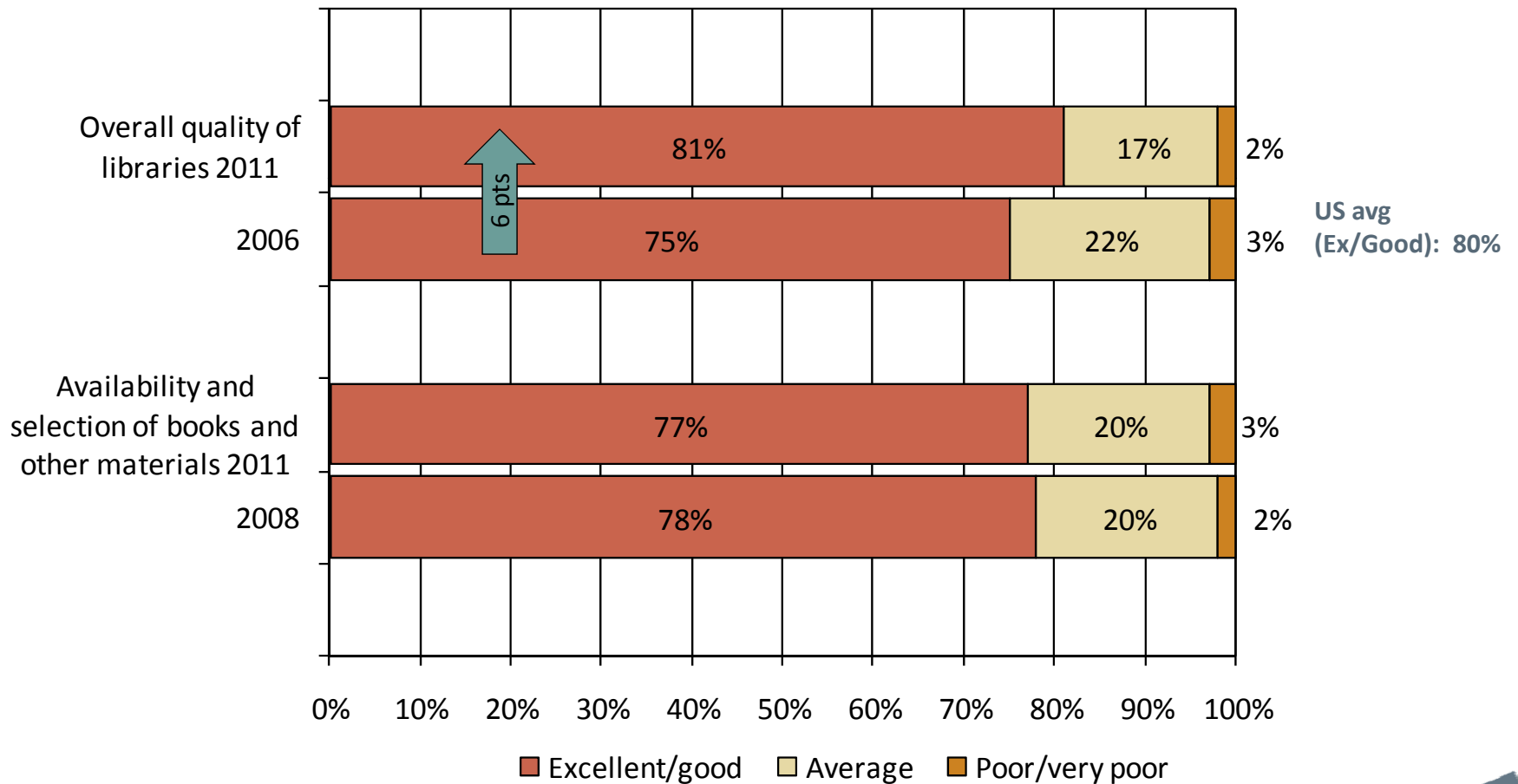
