Friends Reel In a 5K Check at ShareTank

In 2018 the library will launch Programming Our Future, a new digital literacy initiative with a full array of classes aimed at shifting children and teens from technology users into the next generation of developers, programmers and software engineers. South Irving Library staff developed the initiative back in the fall, but it wouldn't see the light of day until better funding was secured. That's when the Friends came to the rescue by diving head first into Irving's 2017 ShareTank!

Friends President Anna Walther, Publicity Chairwoman Marilyn Willems, and Director Kaye Hickox suited up for the four and a half-day Share Tank training experience, which helps non-profits learn fundraising and promotional techniques. The workshop culminated in a Pitch Day where each organization competed for funding using the newly learned concepts. Kaye Hickox and Anna Walther made a flawless presentation on Pitch Day and were awarded with the grand prize of \$5,000. Programming Our Future was so popular with the judges that they were immediately interested in expanding the program!

The money went toward purchasing new technology for children to explore the world of coding. Besides teaching the fundamentals of how our digital world works, coding classes can help students see success in related areas, such as math, science and reading. This February South Irving Library will roll out the first two classes in the series: Tiny Tinkers and Junior Robotics.


Admission is free for all attendees. Parking is \$8 for a vehicle of any size.







A LIBRARY CARD FOR MR. HANSON

Valley Ranch Library staff were touched when a sweet woman came in to sign up for a new library card. The card was not for her, but for her husband who had spent years purchasing books and had never thought to use his local library. She wanted to get him the card as a Christmas present, and also as a cost-savings measure. You see, Mr. Hanson is seventy-one years young, and it was time for the two retirees to trim expenses.

Since library policies would not allow Mrs. Hanson to register her husband for a card, staff member Stefanie Dunnam came up with a creative solution. She suggested that Mrs. Hanson slip a Library Card information brochure into her husband's stocking with a cute bow, then return with him after the holidays. Mrs. Hanson did exactly as suggested.

On Dec. 26, the two returned to register for Mr. Hanson's first ever Irving Public Library card. He was amazed at the selection and the simple process for obtaining the card. It was over so fast, he could hardly believe his eyes.

In fact, he wondered why he hadn't done it sooner. He was having so much fun that when he was jokingly offered the "Arthur's First Card" sticker, he took it and wore it proudly while posing for pictures with Valley Ranch Library staff member Sandy Ellis. He had such a great time that day, and we expect many more now that he is a member of the Irving Public Library System.

During the course of 2017, over 16,400 borrower registrations were performed, many of them were first time cards. We are so excited to see people who are in love with their local library and are bringing family and friends into the fold.



DRIVE-UP CONVENIENCE

South Irving Library's pick-up window will speed up and simplify your life.

Chilly winter weather. Sleeping child. Short lunch break. Are you finding it difficult to stop by the library to pick up books or DVDs? Wouldn't it be great if you could check-out your next favorite read without leaving your car?

Good news! The South Irving Library's drive-thru window is open for business. Located in the west side parking lot next to the building, it's easy to zip through to pick up items with your library card.

How to Place a Hold for the Drive-thru

- 1) After finding an item in the [Polaris catalog](#), click on the Place Request button. You may need to log in at this point with your library card number and PIN.
- 2) On the "Place a Request" screen, click to open the Pickup Library drop down box, and select South Drive-thru Window
- 3) Click Submit Request button to finish your request.

After you've been notified the item is ready, you have 8 days to check it out at the window.

South Irving Library Drive-thru Hours:

Monday to Thursday 10 a.m. to 8:30 p.m.
Friday, Saturday 10 a.m. to 5:30 p.m.
Sunday 1 to 4:30 p.m.

Note: due to the building's size, staff at the drive-thru cannot retrieve items held at the first floor Information/Check-out desk.
