

ORDINANCE NO. ORD-2013-9464

AN ORDINANCE CANVASSING THE RETURNS AND DECLARING THE RESULTS OF THE GENERAL MUNICIPAL ELECTION HELD ON MAY 11, 2013; FOR THE PURPOSE OF ELECTING THREE COUNCIL MEMBERS FOR IRVING CITY COUNCIL, PLACES 1, 2, AND 7 FOR A TERM OF THREE (3) YEARS; AND CANVASSING THE RETURNS AND DECLARING THE RESULTS OF A SPECIAL ELECTION REGARDING THE ADOPTION OR REJECTION OF TWENTY-FIVE (25) PROPOSED AMENDMENTS TO THE EXISTING CHARTER OF THE CITY OF IRVING.

WHEREAS, the City of Irving, Texas, held a General Municipal Election on the 11th day of May, 2013 for the purpose of electing Council members to Places 1, 2, and 7 for a term of three (3) years; and

WHEREAS, the City of Irving, Texas, also held a Special Election on the 11th day of May, 2013 for the purpose of submitting to the qualified voters of the city of Irving, Texas, twenty-five (25) amendments to the Charter of the City of Irving, Texas; and

WHEREAS, public notice of such Municipal Elections were duly given, and such elections were duly and properly held and administered in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas, the Charter of the City of Irving, and the Federal Voting Rights Act; and

WHEREAS, a canvass of the General and Special Election returns was conducted on May 22, 2013; and

WHEREAS, it was found that the persons herein named received the following votes for said term of office on the Irving City Council of the City of Irving, Texas:

WHEREAS, it was found that the following amendments to the City of Irving Charter were submitted to all residents and qualified electors of the City for the purpose of adopting or rejecting

twenty-five (25) separately proposed amendments to the City Charter as hereinafter delineated and the following votes were cast for or against the twenty-five (25) separately proposed amendments:

Amendment No. 1 – *Changing, updating or clarifying the powers of the City.*

Art. III, Sec. 1 will add or clarify that the City shall have the power to recover damages, costs, and penalties.

Amendment No. 2 – *Changing, updating or clarifying the charter to be gender-neutral in language; to correct non-substantive errors such as misspellings, punctuation, grammar, sentence structure and capitalization; to remove archaic language and/or outdated dates or language; to reflect current ordinances.*

Art. III, Sec. 4 removes “in no wise” and replace with “not” to be more grammatically correct.

Art. III, Sec. 24 updates capitalization and provides that members of the Police Department shall be known as Police Officers instead of policemen.

Art. III, Sec. 26 removes “for it” and replace with “acting as its agent” to clarify.

Art. IV, Sec. 1 is a gender-neutral change that provides “councilmen” shall be changed to “council members.”

Art. IV, Sec. 3(a) removes “next preceding the election” and replaces with “immediately prior to election day” to replace outdated language to be consistent with statutory language and clarifies grammar by replacing “district for which that person seeks election as herein provided” with “City”.

Art. IV, Sec. 3(c) adds “as provided herein” language and changes outdated Ordinance No. 2721 to Ordinance No. 2011-9292 regarding boundaries of council districts.

Art. IV, Sec. 5(b) adds the word “between” to clarify the grammar of the sentence.

Art. IV, Sec. 8(b) is a gender-neutral change that changes the word “his” to “that.”

Art. IV, Sec. 11(d) removes a reference to an old effective date which initiated present compensation levels for the council.

Art. IV, Sec. 12 is a gender-neutral change that changes the words “him” or “he” to “the mayor.”

Art. IV, Sec. 26 clarifies that the court has jurisdiction over all matters consistent with the laws of Texas.

Art. IV, Sec. 26(a) is a gender-neutral change that changes the word “his” to “the Judge’s.”

Art. IV, Sec. 26(c) is a gender-neutral change that deletes the word “his.”

Art. IV, Sec. 32 deletes reference to the “city treasurer” which is no longer a city position, this was deleted by voters in the May 2010 charter amendment election.

Art. VI, Sec. 1(a) is a gender-neutral change that changes the words “he” and “his” to “the secretary” and “the secretary’s.”

Art. VI, Sec. 1(c) is a gender-neutral change that changes the words “his” or “he” to “the secretary’s” and “the secretary” and changes the word “his” to “the.”

Art. VI, Sec. 1(g) is a gender-neutral change that changes the word “councilman” to “council member;” changes the grammar from “person” to “council member;” changes the word “his” to “the council member’s;” clarifies outdated language by deleting the words “by striking out either of these propositions, may indicate his vote for the one not so stricken out” and add the words “shall mark the box for or against the council member being named for recall.”

Art. VI, Sec. 1(h) is a gender-neutral change that changes the words “he” to “the council member;” changes the word “his” to “the council member’s;” changes the grammar from “officer” to “council member.”

Art. VI, Sec. 1(j) is a gender-neutral change that changes the word “he takes” to “taking.”

Art. VIII, Sec. 3 is a gender-neutral change that changes the words from “he” or “him” to “the city manager.”

Amendment No. 3 – *The changes to these sections are minor changes or additions to reflect current operations already being performed by the city council or designated departments.*

Art. III, Sec. 22 is changed by adding that the City shall have the power to establish a Fire Department, a Fire Chief, and/or any other positions as deemed appropriate to the Fire Department.

Art. III, Sec. 24 is changed by adding that all Police Officers are “sworn” officers.

Art. IV, Sec. 8(a) provides that since the system of three (3) year alternating terms is already in place, the section is changed by deleting some of the language originally necessary to begin the alternating election process. Additionally, it clarifies that “council member” includes the mayor with the persons holding the eight (8) other places on the council.

Art. IV, Sec. 8(d) the section is changed by deleting some of the language originally necessary to begin the alternating election process.

Art. IV, Sec. 24 is changed by adding the duty of the city secretary to be the chief election official.

Art. IV, Sec. 32 is changed by adding that the city manager must submit a structurally balanced budget annually, and must submit a financial report to the council quarterly.

Amendment No. 4 – *The change concerns reimbursable contracts.*

Art. III, Sec. 26(d) requires the City to be able to review reimbursable expenses on all contracts.

Amendment No. 5 – *Changes to these sections reflect the requirements of the Court Order for Benavidez v. the City of Irving regarding Single Member Districts.*

Art. IV, Sec. 2(b) designates that Places 1, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 are single member district places, Places 2 and 8 and the Mayor are at-large places and provides that candidates for those places must have resided in that district for 12 months immediately prior to the election.

Art. IV, Sec. 3(b) designates that Places 1, 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7 are single member district places.

Art. IV, Sec. 3(c) deletes references to the old districts.

Art. IV, Sec. 4 deletes the words “entire” and “of the entire” to reflect that some members are now elected by single member districts.

Amendment No. 6 – *Several changes are proposed to reflect the requirements of the Texas Election Code or other statutes.*

Art. IV, Sec. 3(b) is changed by deleting “prior to the filing deadline” and replacing with “immediately prior to election day.”

Art. IV, Sec. 5(b) deletes the requirement that the runoff election be held two weeks after the regular election so as to come into compliance with state law.

Art. IV, Sec. 6 provides that the City’s election shall be on state-mandated uniform election dates and in accordance with state law.

Art. IV, Sec. 9(a) provides that runoff elections and special elections to fill vacancies in municipal office shall be held in accordance with the requirements of state law.

Art. IV, Sec. 26(a) in reference to state law that the mayor or mayor pro tem may not automatically assume the role of judge of the municipal court and reference to the same has been deleted.

Art. V, Sec. 3 addresses property tax rolls which are not delinquent but are overdue according to supplemental tax rolls. Deletes “of six percent (6%) per annum” which is not the statutory rate and replaces the language with “specified by statute.”

Art. VI, Sec. 1(e) comes into compliance with the Texas Election Code requirements by deleting the words “forty nor more than” and by changing the words from “with the time aforesaid” to “on the next uniform election date.”

Amendment No. 7 – Changing term limits for members of the city council.

Art. IV, Sec. 8(d) reduces term limits from four (4) full consecutive three (3) year terms to three (3) full consecutive three (3) year terms.

Amendment No. 8 – The change provides options for term-limited council members.

Art. IV, Sec. 8(e) a council member who has served three (3) full consecutive terms may not run for another place on the council for one (1) year except the person may run for mayor. A mayor who has served three (3) full consecutive terms may not run for mayor or another place on the council for one (1) year.

Amendment No. 9 – *The change provides for forfeiture of office of council members.*

Art. IV, Sec. 9(b) adds a provision that a council member finally convicted of a felony shall resign and forfeit that office.

Amendment No. 10 – *The change provides for a Deputy Mayor pro tem.*

Art. IV, Sec. 10 in the absence of the Mayor pro tem, the Deputy Mayor pro tem shall perform all the duties of the Mayor pro tem.

Amendment No. 11 – *The change updates the compensation of the mayor and council members.*

Art. IV, Sec. 11(a) provides that the mayor receive a salary of twelve hundred dollars per month.

Art. IV, Sec. 11(b) provides that each council member receive a salary of nine hundred dollars per month.

Amendment No. 12 – *The change provides for resignation of a council member who moves to another district but does not move out of the city.*

Art. IV, Sec. 11-A provides that a council member who moves out of the city automatically forfeits the office pursuant to Sec. 8(b). A council member who moves out of their district but not out

of the city shall automatically resign from office, but shall remain in office until their successor is chosen at the next regular election or a special municipal election called for another purpose.

Amendment No. 13 – *The change provides for a Code of Ethics.*

Art. IV, Sec. 15-A provides that the city council may prescribe such policies and procedures and shall set appropriate standards of conduct for elected and appointed officials of the city.

Amendment No. 14 – *The change concerns the passage of ordinances.*

Art. IV, Sec. 17 provides that all ordinances, resolutions or orders may be passed at any public meeting of the council and deleting references to emergency measures.

Amendment No. 15 – *The change provides for residency requirements of appointed officials.*

Art. IV, Sec. 24 provides reference to the city secretary’s residency requirement. It changes the requirement that the city secretary shall reside in the city to reflect state law which provides pursuant to Section 150.021 of the Texas Local Government Code the governing body may require the city secretary to reside in the city.

Amendment No. 16 – *The change concerns departments not reporting to the city manager; moves certain sections of the charter from one Article to another Article; and clarifies reporting structures regarding budgets and employees of these departments.*

Art. VIII, Sec. 6 titled Irving Convention and Visitors Bureau is moved to Art. IX, Sec. 10 and titled Independent Boards, (a) Irving Convention and Visitors Bureau; clarifies that city council may by ordinance provide the management and operations of the Bureau shall be conducted independently of the Office of the City Manager.

Art. IX, Sec. 10(a) provides that the Board of Directors of the Irving Convention and Visitors Bureau shall recommend a budget to the city council and the city council shall have final approval of the Bureau's budget and expenditure of budgeted funds and the classification of the Bureau department employees.

Art. IX, Sec. 10(a) the Council by Ordinance may provide that the Board of Directors of the Irving Convention and Visitors Bureau shall have the right to appoint, remove and supervise the Executive Director of the Bureau, and may give the Executive Director exclusive authority to hire, discharge and supervise the employees of the Bureau.

Art. VIII, Sec. 7 titled Irving Arts Center is moved to Art. IX, Sec. 10 and titled Independent Boards, (b) Irving Arts Center; clarifies that city council may by ordinance provide the management and operations of the Arts Center shall be conducted independently of the Office of the City Manager.

Art. IX, Sec. 10(b) provides that the Irving Arts Board shall recommend a budget to the city council and the city council shall have final approval of the Irving Arts Center's budget and expenditure of budgeted funds and the classification of the Irving Arts Center department employees.

Art. IX, Sec. 10(b) the Council by Ordinance may provide that the Irving Arts Board shall have the right to appoint, remove and supervise the Executive Director of the Irving Arts Center and may give the Executive Director exclusive authority to hire, discharge and supervise the employees of the Arts Center.

Art. VIII, Sec. 8 titled Irving Housing and Human Services Department and Art. VIII, Sec. 9 titled Irving Preservation Department are moved to Art. IX, Sec. 11 and titled Irving Special Purpose Agencies.

Art. IV, Sec. 24 the Council shall have final approval of the city secretary's budget and expenditure of budgeted funds and the classification of the city secretary's department employees.

Art. IV, Sec. 24 the city secretary shall hire, discharge and supervise other employees of the city secretary's office.

Art. IV, Sec. 25 the Council shall have final approval of the city attorney's budget and expenditure of budgeted funds and the classification of the city attorney's department employees.

Art. IV, Sec. 25 the city attorney shall hire, discharge and supervise other employees of the city attorney's office.

Amendment No. 17 – *The change provides for a city attorney by charter.*

Art. IV, Sec. 25 provides that the city council shall appoint a city attorney, admitted to practice law in the State of Texas with four years experience. The city attorney shall be the chief legal advisor of all offices, officers, departments, and employees of the city, and shall represent the city in all legal proceedings.

Amendment No. 18 – *The changes to this Article make additions, deletions or clarifications to recall provisions.*

Art. VI Sec. 1(a) provides that a qualified voter initiating the recall process must live in the district of the person sought to be removed; signers of the petition must live in the district of the person sought to be removed. Changes the return time for the petition from thirty (30) days to forty-five (45) days for a single member district, and to sixty (60) days for the mayor or an at-large district. It also removes the twenty percent (20%) requirement for those signing the affidavit to have voted in the last election.

Art. VI, Sec. 1(b) deletes the sample petition and references the Texas Election Code for the current required format; deletes the affidavit form which is not a condition of validating a recall petition.

Art. VI, Sec. 1(c) deletes reference to the committee of petitioners; changes the time for the city secretary to examine from ten (10) days to thirty (30) days; clarifies that the city secretary notify the “affiant” of defects instead of the “committee of the petitioners.”

Art. VI, Sec. 1(d) provides that upon insufficiency of a recall petition, the affiant shall not file further affidavits through the duration of the term in office of the person sought to be removed. Deletes provisions applicable to amending a recall petition.

Art. VI, Sec. 1(h) provides that if a sitting member of the council wins a majority vote of the recall election, such council member cannot again be subject to a recall for the remainder of the term of which the petition was filed.

Art. VI, Sec. 1(j) provides that upon a council member taking office, the member shall not be recalled within six (6) months and deletes the word “three;” deletes the six-month time period after a recall election during which a mayor or council member may not be subject to recall; adds that no recall petition may be filed within 270 days of the end of the term of a mayor or council member.

Amendment No. 19 – *The change relates to the qualifications of the city manager.*

Art. VIII, Sec. 1 adds that the city manager shall become a qualified voter of the city following the city manager’s appointment and reside within the city limits.

Art. VIII, Sec. 2 adds that the city manager shall be evaluated at least annually.

Amendment No. 21 – *The change relates to the powers and duties of the city manager.*

Art. VIII, Sec. 3 provides that employees reporting directly to the city council or boards of directors as appointed by the city council shall not be removed by the city manager; provides that employees reporting directly to the city council or boards of directors as appointed by the city council shall solely hire, discharge and supervise their staff; provides that the city manager shall exercise control and supervision over all other departments and offices created by the council.

Amendment No. 22 – *The change adds initiative and referendum to the charter.*

Art. XI, Sections 1-8 provide for the addition of Article XI, Sections 1-8 addressing initiative and referendum. Initiative is the power to propose lawful ordinances to the council for the city council’s vote or the vote of the citizens at an election. Referendum is the power to require reconsideration of an ordinance by the council or the citizens at an election.

Art. XI, Sections 1-8 provide for general authority; commencement of proceeding, petitioner’s committee, and affidavit; petitions; procedure after filing; referendum petitions; suspension of effective ordinance; action on petitions; results of election; initiative and referendum – failure of city council to act.

Art. IX, Sec. 3 provides that the city shall not withhold from the pay of its employees for purposes of conveying those funds to political action committees.

Amendment No. 24 – *The addition provides for charter commentary.*

Art. IX, Sec. 9 provides that portions of the charter may become inapplicable due to changes in state or federal law. In such event, the city attorney may develop commentary giving notice to the citizens.

Amendment No. 25 – *The change relates to limitations on contributions for retirement benefits.*

Art. IX, Sec. 8, the total annual amount of the city of Irving contribution for retirement benefits is raised from 15.75% to 16.75% of annual salaries.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF IRVING, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That the General and Special elections held on May 11, 2013 were duly and legally called and notice thereof given in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas, the Charter of the City of Irving, and the Federal Voting Rights Act and the ordinances calling said elections; that said elections were held in strict conformity with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, the Charter of the City of Irving, and the Federal Voting Rights Act, and the returns thereof have been

properly made to the officials of the City of Irving entitled to receive the same, and that said elections properly represents the desires of the voters of the City of Irving.

SECTION 2. That the following named candidates were duly elected at said municipal election to the respective named offices of the City of Irving:

Gerald Farris – Council member Place 7, District 7 – Single Member

SECTION 3. That a run off election will be held on June 15, 2013, between Loren Byers and John Danish to determine who will be elected Council member Place 1, District 1 – Single Member.

SECTION 4. That a run-off election will be held on June 15, 2013, between Kensley Stewart and Allan E. Meagher to determine who will be elected Council member Place 2, At Large.

SECTION 5. That majority of the qualified voters of said City, voting at said election, voted “yes” on the following amendments and those said amendments were duly adopted and shall become part of the Charter of the City of Irving, Texas, and that the Charter of the City of Irving, adopted by the qualified voters of the City of Irving at an election on October 25, 1952, is hereby declared to be amended to conform to Amendment Nos. 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, and 25 adopted by the qualified voters of the City of Irving, Texas, at said election held on the 11th day of May, 2013.

SECTION 6. The City Secretary shall certify to the Texas Secretary of State an authenticated copy of the Charter under the seal of the City showing the approval of the Charter amendments

approved by the qualified voters of the City of Irving, Texas, duly adopted at the May 11, 2013, election. The City Secretary shall record this ordinance in the City's official records.

SECTION 7. It is hereby declared that the City of Irving approves and accepts the results of the General Election for Council Members, Place 1, Place 2, and Place 7, as set forth in the Election Returns Sheet attached herein as "Exhibit A" and that the City of Irving approves and accepts the results of the Special Election submitted to all residents and qualified electors of the City for the purpose of adopting or rejecting twenty-five (25) separately proposed amendments to the City Charter, as determined by the majority vote of the qualified voters of the City of Irving, Texas, as set forth in the Special Election Returns Sheet attached herein as "Exhibit 8."


SECTION 8. All ordinances and resolutions, or parts thereof, which are in conflict or inconsistent with any provision of this ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict, and the provisions of this ordinance shall be and remain controlling as to the matters resolved herein.

SECTION 9. Should any court of competent jurisdiction declare any section, subsection, clause, or phrase of this ordinance unconstitutional or invalid, it is expressly provided that any and all remaining portions of this ordinance shall remain in full force and effect. Irving hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinances, and each section, subsection, clauses, and phrases be declared unconstitutional or invalid.


SECTION 10. It is officially found, determined, and declared that the meeting at which this ordinance is adopted was open to the public and public notice of the time, place, and subject matter of the public business to be considered at such meeting was given.

SECTION 11. This ordinance shall be construed and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Texas and the United States of America.
